DEAR DELEGATES,

MUNBOLDT 2026 upholds the highest standards of conduct and decorum. All participants — including chairs, delegates, and advisors — are expected to actively maintain an environment that is respectful, safe, and inclusive at all times.

Any failure to adhere to these standards will result in immediate removal from the event and punishment, without exception.

CODE OF CONDUCT

All delegates are expected to embody the values of professionalism, decorum, and diplomacy throughout the entirety of the conference. The following regulations are to be strictly observed:

- Delegates must maintain diplomatic behavior at all times, both within and outside committee sessions. Disrespectful or disruptive conduct will not be tolerated under any circumstances.
- The use of mobile phones and Artificial Intelligence during sessions is strictly prohibited, unless explicitly authorized by the chair
- Compliance with the official dress code is mandatory. Formal Western business attire is required at all times. Violations of the dress code are considered breaches of protocol and will be treated with utmost seriousness.
- Delegates who fail to comply with committee rules will receive a formal warning. Repeated infractions will result in the delegate being removed from the session, with potential consequences extending to their participation in the remainder of the conference.
- Advisors hold final responsibility for the behavior of their delegates. They are expected to remain available and to actively support all measures that preserve a respectful and safe environment for all participants.

MUNBOLDT 2026 – COMMITTEE PROCEDURE PROTOCOL

The following chart outlines the official procedural framework to be observed in all MUNBOLDT 2026 committees. This includes the recognized points and motions, as well as their respective order of precedence.

All motions introduced during committee sessions will be heard by the dais and subsequently voted upon, following the strict priority order detailed in this guide. No motion shall supersede another, unless it holds a higher procedural rank.

Delegates are expected to familiarize themselves thoroughly with this procedure, as proper usage and timing of points and motions are essential for the effective and diplomatic functioning of all sessions.

MUNBOLDT 2025 – COMMITTEE FLOW & EXPECTATIONS

While a general conference schedule will be provided to all MUNBOLDT 2025 participants, the internal organization and session flow may vary depending on the committee's nature, structure, and agenda. Nevertheless, delegates can anticipate the following core components across all sessions:

Keynote Speaker

To enrich the debate and ground it in real-world expertise, the MUNBOLDT High Command will invite a distinguished expert in a field related to the committee's topic to deliver an opening address.

This presentation will typically take place during the first committee session and may extend throughout its duration.

Delegates are strongly encouraged to engage actively with the speaker through thoughtful questions. This is an essential opportunity to clarify complex issues, deepen understanding, and strengthen the foundation for the subsequent debate.

Speakers List and Position Papers

During the opening stages of committee work, a Speakers List will be opened to allow delegates to present their country's position. While participation in the Speakers List is optional, it provides an excellent opportunity for delegates to:

- Share their position paper with the committee
- Defend their policy stance
- Address proposed solutions
- Respond to questions from fellow delegates

Please note that regardless of whether a delegate presents during the Speakers List, the submission of a position paper is mandatory for award consideration.

MUNBOLDT 2026 – DEBATE FORMATS & FINAL PROCEDURES

All delegates are expected to participate in the various formats of debate with professionalism, respect for protocol, and full adherence to the rules of procedure. The following outlines the structure and expectations for the principal debate mechanisms used throughout MUNBOLDT 2026:

Moderated Caucus

The moderated caucus offers a more structured and focused method of debate, allowing delegates to address specific aspects of the topic in a time-efficient manner. Delegates request the floor by raising their placards only once the floor has been opened.

The chair or moderator manages speaking time and determines the order of speakers.

Key guidelines to observe:

- Personal pronouns are strictly discouraged. Delegates must refer to themselves in the third person (e.g., "We as an international community...").
- Do not raise placards until the moderator has officially opened the floor.
- Do not interrupt a delegate who has the floor, unless invoking a Right of Reply or raising a Point of Personal Privilege deemed relevant and necessary.

Unmoderated Caucus

The unmoderated caucus offers a less formal environment in which delegates may move freely, collaborate, and negotiate directly with others in order to draft working papers or resolution documents.

Even in this more dynamic setting, professionalism and adherence to conference language and rules remain mandatory.

Key reminders:

- The official language of the committee remains in effect throughout the unmoderated caucus. Failure to comply may result in formal warnings.
- A minimum of two working papers or resolution drafts must be produced for the committee's work to be considered complete.
- The use of mobile devices is strictly prohibited during unmoderated caucuses unless explicitly permitted by the chair for documentation purposes.

Reading and Presentation of the Final Resolution Paper

Once the committee has debated, amended, and passed a resolution, the final document will be presented to the corresponding main organ of MUNBOLDT 2026 (e.g., General Assembly or Security Council).

- Two delegates will be selected by the chairs to present and defend the resolution on behalf of the committee.

- The main organ will deliberate and proceed to a final vote to determine whether or not the resolution is accepted as official UN policy within the simulation.

This stage represents the culmination of the committee's efforts and serves as the formal closure of its agenda.

MUNBOLDT 2026 – WORKING PAPERS & RESOLUTION PAPERS

As part of the committee's progress toward constructive debate and problem-solving, delegates are expected to collaborate in the drafting of Working Papers and, subsequently, Resolution Papers. These documents serve to formalize the proposed solutions regarding the topic under discussion.

Working Papers

Definition:

Working Papers are preliminary and informal documents that consolidate the proposed resolutions and ideas developed by delegates during the committee. These papers serve as a foundational step toward building a final resolution.

Requirements & Guidelines:

- Each committee must produce a minimum of two Working Papers. However, the number may increase at the discretion of the chairs and committee members.
- Sponsors and signatories are not required; instead, a list of contributing participants should be included.
- While not mandatory, the use of operative clauses is highly recommended to ensure clarity and alignment with formal resolution structure.

Submission Procedure:

- Working Papers must be submitted directly to the Committee Director.
- The Director will either grant approval or return the paper with specific recommendations for revision.

Resolution Papers

Definition:

Once a Working Paper has been discussed, refined, and deemed complete, it may be elevated to the status of a Resolution Paper—the formal culmination of the committee's work.

Presentation Guidelines:

- Resolution Papers will be presented by three members of the corresponding Working Paper team, chosen internally.
- Following the reading, the committee may pose up to seven questions for the presenting team to clarify any aspects of the proposal.
- Resolution Papers are not subject to a committee vote, as their purpose is to represent the finalized stance and proposals of the group, which will later be passed on to the main organ of MUNBOLDT for consideration.
