MUNBOLDT 2026 – EXAMPLE POSITION PAPER

Your Position Paper should include:

- **Committee:** (e.g., Human Rights Council)
- **Topic:** (Full official topic name)
- **Country:** (Official country name)
- **Delegate:** (Your full name)
- **School:** (Your institution)

(on the left side of the document header)

- **IMPORTANT:** Delegates must place their country's official flag on the **RIGHT SIDE** of the document header in color.

Body (3–5 paragraphs recommended)

A. Introduction (Paragraph 1)

- Greet the committee formally
- Briefly introduce the topic
- State why it is important globally

B. Background & Context (Paragraph 2)

- Define the issue
- Explain key concepts
- Mention global perspectives or challenges

C. Country Position (Paragraph 3)

- Explain your country's laws, policies, or stance
- Mention whether your country supports or opposes the issue
- Include relevant facts (legal status, cultural factors, etc.)

Tip: Always speak as the country (not personal opinion)

D. Proposed Solutions (Paragraph 4)

- Present realistic and diplomatic solutions
- Ensure they align with your country's position
- Keep proposals clear and actionable

E. Conclusion (Final Paragraph)

- Summarize your position
- Emphasize cooperation
- End formally

REMINDER:

Stay Objective and Diplomatic

- Avoid aggressive or emotional language
- Respect different viewpoints

Write in Third Person

Always refer to your country formally:

- "This delegation"
- "The government of [Country]"

4. Formatting Guidelines

- Font: Times New Roman or Arial
- Size: 11–12 pt
- Spacing: 1.15–1.5
- Length: 1–2 pages (unless specified otherwise)
- Alignment: Justified
- Margins: Standard (2.5 cm / 1 inch)

WORKING PAPER**

Working Paper A2

- **Committee:** United Nations Human Rights Council
- **Topic:** Freedom of Press in Authoritarian Regimes
- **Participants:** France, Mexico, Japan, Germany, Brazil, South Korea

Operative Clauses: (—> solutions)

1. **Proposes** the development of an international coalition to document and publicly report violations of press freedom in authoritarian regimes;
2. **Encourages** the implementation of journalist protection programs, including digital safety tools and secure reporting channels;
3. **Recommends** collaboration between the UN and NGOs to establish emergency relocation protocols for threatened journalists;
4. **Supports** financial aid and training for independent media organizations operating under restrictive conditions;
5. **Calls upon** member states to review and reform national laws that unjustly restrict media activity;
6. **Requests** the Human Rights Council to hold biannual sessions focused specifically on media suppression in authoritarian contexts.

Resolution paper A1

- **Committee:** United Nations Human Rights Council
- **Topic:** Freedom of Press in Authoritarian Regimes
- **Sponsors:** France, Canada, Sweden
- **Signatories:** Germany, Mexico, South Korea, Japan (32% of committee)

Addressed to: United Nations General Assembly

Preambulatory clauses):

- *Recognizing* the critical role of a free and independent press in promoting democratic values and transparency,
- *Concerned* by the increasing threats and censorship imposed on journalists in authoritarian regimes,
- *Recalling* Article 19 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights as a foundation for freedom of expression,
- *Acknowledging* the efforts made by NGOs and civil society to support journalists under threat,

FORMAT:

- In *Italics*
- Ended by a coma
- In bullet points

Operative clauses: (long-, mid- and short term solutions)

1. **Calls for** the establishment of a UN-led international safety training program for journalists reporting in conflict zones;
2. **Recommends** partnerships with independent watchdogs to monitor freedom of press violations and publish annual reports;
3. **Encourages** funding and digital protection tools for online media under threat from state censorship;
4. **Supports** the creation of a confidential UN platform for whistleblowers and journalists to report violations;
5. **Requests** all member states to submit yearly national press freedom status reports to the Human Rights Council;
6. **Proposes** the appointment of a Special Rapporteur on Journalistic Freedoms; and
7. **Urges** authoritarian states to repeal laws that criminalize legitimate journalistic practices.
